THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME His Word Today by Rev. William J. Reilly

"Rolling up the scroll he gave it to the assistant and sat down. All in the synagogue had their eyes fixed on him. Then he began by saying to them, 'Today this Scripture passage is fulfilled in your hearing.'"

Jesus returns to his hometown, a person of great fame and reputation, surely many went to welcome and receive Him. The prophet Isaiah summarizes His mission to bring glad tidings to the poor, seek freedom for captives, restore sight, and proclaim a year of favor from the Lord.

We have just begun a jubilee year, a Year of Mercy. Pope Francis has taught us that mercy is God's greatest gift. We are told that 'Jesus Christ is the face of God's mercy.' Mercy has become living and visible in Jesus of Nazareth.

In designating this year for this purpose, Pope Francis is calling people to the path of conversion. As missionary disciples we have the opportunity to invite others to have hope, a fundamental theme of the Holy Father. At a time when refugees and asylees are found on every continent, we are able to assist them. Those blinded by sin and selfishness can open their eyes, when they see true disciples living a vibrant faith.

Like the people of Nazareth we refocus and place our eyes on Jesus. He speaks to us of Himself and our role in His mission.

Is "Ordinary Time" really that ordinary?

Ordinary Time is called "ordinary" because the weeks are numbered. The Latin word ordinalis, which refers to numbers in a series, stems from the Latin word *ordo*, from which we get the English word *order*. Thus, Ordinary Time is in fact the ordered life of the Church—the period in which we live our lives neither in feasting (as in the Christmas and Easter seasons) or in more severe penance (as in Advent and Lent), but in watchfulness and expectation of the Second Coming of Christ.

THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

First Reading: Nehemiah 8:2-4a, 5-6, 8-10

Ezra gathered the people and read to them from the book of the Law of God. He interpreted the law clearly, so that everyone understood what he had read. He then told them to go and rejoice in the Lord.

Second Reading: I Corinthians 12:12-30

Paul explains that a body is composed of many different parts, and that each part has its' own purpose and is important. He compares this to the Church, describing how we are one body composed of many members. All members should show concern for each other and understand that we are all vital to the body as a whole.

Gospel: Luke 1:1-4, 4:14-21

Luke discusses his decision to write about the events he and the other disciples had witnessed. He begins by telling of Jesus reading a passage from the book of Isaiah, where the anointed one is portrayed. Jesus finished by telling the people that they had seen that passage fulfilled in their hearing.

NEW YEAR – NEW BEGINNINGS.....

A <u>new</u> year is already a few weeks <u>old</u>, and for me, this brings with it some new and exciting opportunities that I wanted to share with all of you. After much discernment and personal reflection, I have accepted a position offered to me recently as the new Director of The National Shrine of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel in Middletown, NY. Yes, there is a National Shrine there and it is administered by the Carmelite Order – one of 68 National Shrines throughout the United States! And they are seeking to spread the word and become more known by those in the surrounding area! Some of you accompanied me on a one-day pilgrimage there for the feast day of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel last July, and really didn't even know it existed!

The opportunity to spread the good news of this place of prayer and solitude presented itself to me quite by surprise some months later. The main focus of this new ministry will be to offer organized days of reflection, pilgrimage or just quiet days of prayer and reflection to all who wish to come and experience God's presence in a beautiful, pastoral setting. In addition to this, it was designated by Cardinal Timothy Dolan as a place to visit for a plenary indulgence for the Year of Mercy.

While offering one daily and one Sunday Mass, the shrine is not a parish but also offers indoor space for retreats, personal prayer and a great Catholic gift shop. The outdoor setting is conducive to peaceful reflection, with a Monastic cloister walk with Stations of the Cross, meditative gardens and a beautiful lake and picnic grounds to be enjoyed by all in warmer weather months. And all of this is just 20 minutes from Sussex!

That being said, the parish office will now have some new faces and shorter hours. I plan to continue my ministry here at St. Monica's but more concentrated on offering ongoing opportunities for Adult Faith Formation and Religious Education, as well as assisting Fr. Charles as Pastoral Associate as I have in the past.

These new beginnings are also connected closely with many parish programs throughout the Diocese and beyond, and I hope to bridge many of them and those I have worked with from these parishes to the National Shrine of our Lady of Mt. Carmel! I see this as a very reciprocal endeavor that will enhance the spiritual journeys of many that I have come to know over the years.
