His Word Today.....by Rev. William J. Reilly

"Who can know God's counsel, or who can conceive what the Lord intends? For the deliberations of mortals are timid, and unsure are our plans... Or who can ever know your counsel except you had given wisdom and sent your holy spirit from on high. And thus were the paths of those on earth made straight."

The Old Testament question seems to warrant the answer 'no one.' Because we are gifted with the teaching of Jesus, we are able to answer differently because we have been given the Holy Spirit. We know that God's plan is for all people to be saved and come to knowledge of the truth. The gift of the Holy Spirit allows that plan to take root in our hearts.

Like Solomon who asked for an understanding heart, the gift of wise judgment, we are able to pursue God's plan for us that our paths may be made straight.

Program Helping Young Adults with Special Needs

The Department for Persons with Disabilities (DPD) is proud to announce the fall opening of their Saturdays at the Center program (SATC)! DPD is a nonprofit, Catholic Charities organization in the Diocese of Paterson that provides support for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities and their families. This endeavor is designed for young adults with disabilities living in the community, who are interested in weekend socialization and recreational activities with their peers. Education about group home and independent living is also part of the curriculum. Respite time for caregivers of the participating individuals will be provided, as the program is well supervised by experienced staff and volunteers. SATC will meet Saturdays at Gruenert Center on Rt. 15 in Lake Hopatcong and will run for a 12 week span. Meeting times are from 10 A.M. to 2 P.M. The tuition for the entire program is \$120 plus minimal additional fees for special activities such as bowling or dining out. I, Paul, an old man, and now also a prisoner for Christ Jesus, urge you on behalf of my child Onesimus. (Second Reading)

Reading II: Philemon 9-10, 12-17

The letter to Philemon is the only personal letter of Paul that has survived. Onesimus, a slave who had run away from his master, Philemon, a Christian of Colossae, had joined Paul where the latter was in prison (Rome is the traditional view; Ephesus is popular today because of the distances involved: Colossae-Ephesus rather than Colossae-Rome).

Under Paul's influence, Onesimus had become a Christian. In sending him back to his master, Paul commends him as "no longer a slave but a brother."

Paul did not thereby abolish slavery (that would have been impossible for the ancient world) but transformed the relationship between master and slave. Not until the nineteenth century did the Christian conscience come to realize that slavery as an institution is wrong.

Paul drew what consequences he could from his principle that in Christ there is neither slave nor free. Future generations will have to give their own implementation to that principle in the light of their concrete situation.

"I love this Rembrandt painting. It is an image of Paul that speaks volumes......with writing tool in hand, looking perplexed and wondering what words he should choose to write, he resonates with our own need to find just the right words at crucial times that require it. How many times have we spoken too soon, written something too fast or pushed the "send" button too quickly on an email message that we later regretted sending.

Spending time in contemplative thought requires time.....something that we don't seem to have enough of these days, a commodity that is scarce and precious and yet, so very valuable. How we use our time....and abuse our time....is worth examining as we move through our lives.

Paul's own desires were his <u>first</u> thoughts: "I would have been glad to keep him with me, in order that he might serve me on your behalf during my imprisonment for the gospel" but in deep contemplation and trust in the power of love, he sends his "brother" Onesimus back to his master, and instead suggests that a new relationship should take hold.

Paul's Christian witness to brotherhood and love gives Philemon something to contemplate. His words are a strong examination of conscience and clear message that the world can be changed through the power of love. Contemplate your next words – written or spoken – and make your own message speak volumes!" -----Carol Bezak
