SEVENTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

First Reading: 1 Kings 3:5, 7-12

Solomon, realizing that he will succeed his father David as King of Israel and Judah, begs the Lord to give him wisdom and understanding in order to rule his people well. The Lord grants his request saying, "...there will come no one to equal you."

Second Reading: Romans 8:28-30

As heirs of God and heirs with Christ, we suffer in order to be glorified with Christ.

Gospel: Matthew 13:44-52

Jesus speaks again about the "reign of God," telling the parables of the buried treasure and the merchant's search for pearls. In each parable, Jesus emphasizes that the "reign of God" is more precious and valuable than any treasure.

HIS WORD TODAY *by Rev. William J. Reilly* **Seventeenth Sunday in Ordinary Time**

"Jesus said to his disciples 'The kingdom of heaven is like a treasure buried in a field, which a person finds and hides again and out of joy goes and sells all that he has and buys that field. Again, the kingdom of heaven is like a merchant in search of fine pearls. When he finds a pearl of great price he goes and sells all that he has and buys it.'"

Jesus, the teacher, offers three parables today for our reflection. The two the treasure and the pearl, followed by the net, ask us to consider what the kingdom is really like. Do I find it in my church?

What is the treasure I am looking for, His kingdom? It is His grace, the Sacraments, the life of the church. The pearl is the Christian life which I sometimes fail to appreciate.

I am the one searching for a treasure, the pearl and I live in a community where the net has been thrown and collects all, bad and good. I am asked to sit down and sort out what is good for me and what is not. I resolve to continue my search, discover the treasure offered to me, and work hard to preserve and persevere in my quest. The kingdom is now.

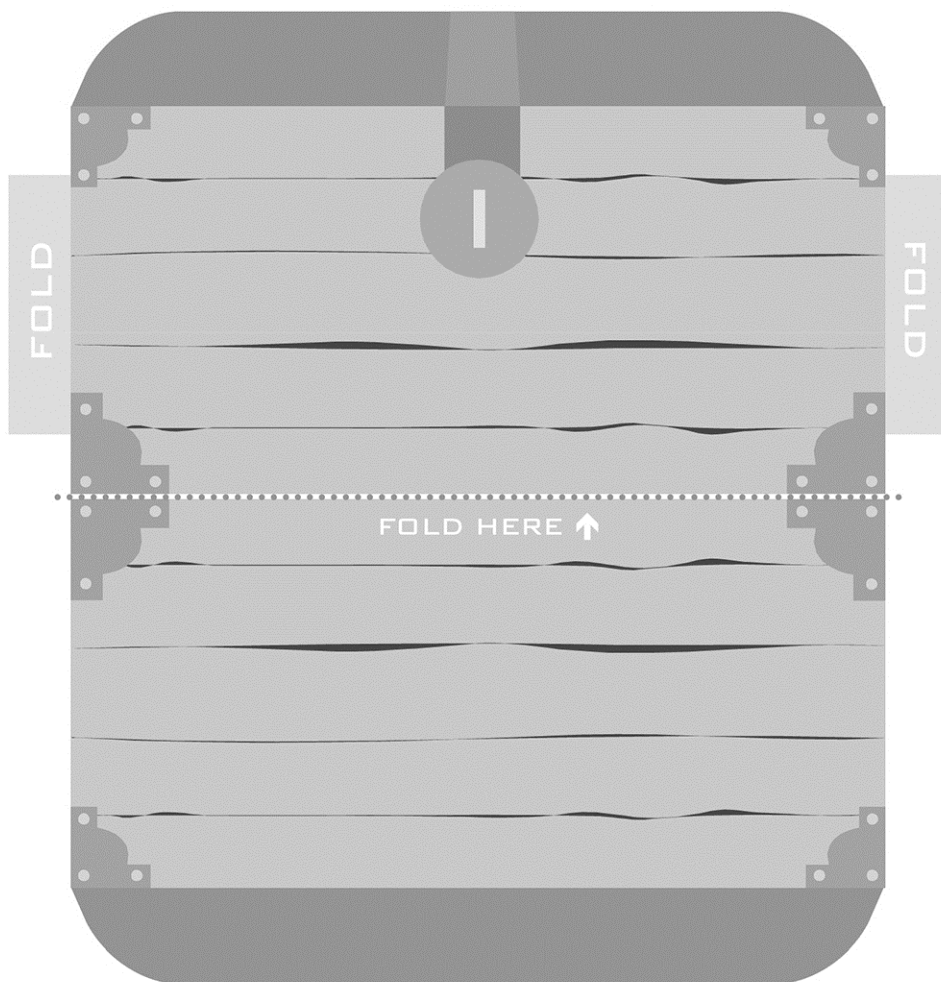

THE SAINTS – PART THREE

Honoring the saints was part of Christianity from the very beginning. This practice came from a long-standing tradition in the Jewish faith of honoring prophets and holy people with shrines. The first saints were martyrs, people who had given up their lives for the Faith in the persecution of Christians. By the year 100 A.D., Christians were honoring other Christians who had died, and asking for their intercession. For hundreds of years, starting with the first martyrs of the early Church, saints were named by public acclaim. Though this was more a more democratic way to recognize saints, some saints' stories were distorted by legend and some never existed. Gradually, the bishops and finally the Vatican took over the authority for approving saints. (Boston Catholic. Org. – Archdiocese of Boston)

Following are three saints whose feast days we celebrate this week.

July 31 – St. Ignatius of Loyola, priest (1491-1556). Patron saint of soldiers and spiritual retreats.

Raised as a Basque gentleman and soldier, he was wounded in battle and, during his convalescence, was inspired by the lives of Christ and the saints to serve God. When well, he wandered, prayed, ministered to the poor and sick, and had mystical experiences that form the basis of his book of Spiritual Exercises. Returning to school, he earned a master's degree from the University of Paris. There he gathered other students for service to Jesus. After ordination, the group went to Rome, where they became the Society of Jesus, or Jesuits. Like him, may we learn "to find God in all things" and do everything "for the greater glory of God."

St. Alphonsus Liguori, bishop and doctor of the Church (1696-1787). Patron saint of moral theologians, confessors and of those suffering from arthritis.

Born in Naples, he became a lawyer at the age seventeen. After losing an important case by overlooking a piece of evidence, he decided to become a priest and later became a bishop. He founded an order of missionary priests that became the Redemptorists. He was widely sought as a preacher and confessor, and his famous book, *Moral Theology* linked his keen legal mind with his kindness and concern for others. Like him, may we learn that "all holiness and perfection of soul lies in our love for Jesus Christ."

St. John Vianney, priest (1786-1859). Patron saint of parish priests.

John was born near Lyons, France. He became the parish priest of the village of Ars-en-Dombes, where he spent the rest of his life. He was so renowned as a confessor that hundreds visited daily. He heard confessions for twelve to sixteen hours a day and gave a short lesson each morning. Three times he tried to join a monastery, but each time was persuaded to return. May we follow his advice to "open your heart so that the word of God may enter it, take root in it, and bear fruit there for eternal life."
