The Virgin Mary is approached by the angel Gabriel, who tells her that she has been chosen to bear the Son of God. Mary is first afraid, yet shows her unquestioning faith when she simply says, "Let it be done to me as you say."


HIS WORD TODAY by Rev. William J. Reilly Fourth Sunday of Advent December 24, 2017

"Do not fear, Mary. You have found favor with God. You shall conceive and bear a son, and give Him the name Jesus. Great will be His dignity and He will be called Son of the Most High."

The great moment in the history of salvation, began with the visit of the angel Gabriel and the invitation to be the mother of Jesus. It is not surprising that Mary hesitated, questioned and then consented. Wouldn't you? Her response 'I am the maidservant of the Lord. Let it be done to me as you say' redirected the course of human history.

The celebration of the Bethlehem event tonight, allows us not just to recall what happened, but to imitate Mary and permit the Lord to touch our lives in a truly special way. Our traditions and customs are rich as we relive Jesus' entering our lives again. The Simbang Gabi celebration of Filipino Catholics or Las Posadas of Latin Catholics lead us to the stable cave to meet and adore the Lord of history, the Lord of today. We have been praying 'Come Lord Jesus' for the four weeks of advent. Today, we welcome Him with joy.

As we celebrate this special night, may we be ready to open our door, not just to Joseph and Mary, but Christ who comes to us.





... FROM THE DESK OF FR. JAN

On Christmas we celebrate what we have been waiting for in 'joyful hope' for whole season of Advent! We celebrate that day when Jesus Christ, the second person of the Holy Trinity, became one of us and one with us, finding a home in our homes and in our hearts. On Christmas we commemorate the incarnation of God on earth!

The birth of Jesus Christ celebrates the grace given us, the fact that God in his love and compassion has come down to earth to dwell among us. The human birth of the Savior celebrates the fact that the boundless God had crossed over inconceivable and unknown borders and has personally bound and humbled Himself to dwell with us as a man. Christmas, in other words, celebrates the fact that the infinite God, at a point in time, crossed an unimaginable border and personally entered our world.

Why did God have to come in person to enter our world? In order to repay a debt he did not owe because we owed a debt (original sin) which we were unable to pay. God sought us out in our dire need and, finding us, chose to dwell among us. The birth of Jesus Christ is the incarnation of God's love and desire to save us, to be with us and to have us be with him. But from what has Jesus saved us? The Prophets, Evangelists, and Apostles make it clear that Jesus has come to save us from the power of darkness and from slavery to sin. Sin enslaves us to the power of darkness and evil, and results in death. Sin is not just a rejection of God's laws and teachings, but sin is a rejection of God's love, His goodness, and what's more, sin is a rejection of a life united with God, who is our only source of life. Without God there is no life, there is only misery of darkness and death. So God seeing our misery promised to save us. He did so by sending His Son, Jesus, to become one of us, who took all of our sins upon Himself, and after paying the price of sin which is death, Christ conquered the power of sin and death and restored life.

So Every Christmas when we celebrate the birth of Baby Jesus, we commemorate the birth of the Savior of the world. When we see Christ as he truly is – the Savior of the world- Christmas comes alive with celebration of love and joy, peace and hope that never ends.

The Christmas image of Jesus is that of a light shining in the darkness. In Christmas we celebrate the fact that when Jesus entered our darkened world light and hope also entered. What Jesus was to the world of his time, He wants us to be to the world of our time. We too must be a beam of light in the midst of darkness. We too must be a ray of hope in the midst of despair.

Christmas is an invitation for each one of us to be for the world what Jesus was to his world. Like the Son of God, we are born to love and to serve as he did. Do we truly love our neighbor? Do we wish to be with him/her and help him/her? Each one of us has something valuable to give. May each one of us learn how to love our neighbor and to use things in service of that love. May we learn from Jesus to relate to one another in the power of love and not in love of power.

The gift of Christmas is Christ Himself. And it's not only once a year that he makes himself available. He is there for us always and in all ways. Let us always strive to share this message of salvation to all and to spread his consoling love especially to those who fail to recognize what Christmas truly means. If Jesus is to be born into today's world, it must be through us. We must be the beam of light in the midst of darkness. We must be the ray of hope in the midst of despair.

On behalf of our entire staff I wish you and your family a Blessed Christmas. May your Christmas be filled with love, peace, and joy.
